## Sheep markets struggle in Niger ahead of Eid al-Adha amid insecurity and economic strain

With Eid al-Adha just days away, sheep markets in Niger are grappling with mounting challenges tied to insecurity and a worsening economic climate.

villages where things are really not going well. So to go and buy sheep there, even to bring them home, is a problem, given the situation now that motorcycles are not allowed."

Bazoum in 2023. The country, one of the poorest in the world, now faces international sanctions and suspended aid. Alongside Mali and Burkina Faso, it forms the Alliance of Sahel States — all governed by military juntas.

In an effort to stabilize sheep supply ahead of the Muslim holiday, the government has banned livestock exports this year. The measure appears to have succeeded in keeping sheep available in local markets, but the impact of the ongoing financial crisis remains deeply felt.

"There is certainly enough livestock," said Hasoumi Daouda, a shopper at the Niamey market. "But in reality, it's the financial crisis that makes them too expensive to buy."

Eid al-Adha, also known as the Feast of Sacrifice, is marked by the traditional slaughter of a sheep to commemorate the willingness of the Prophet Ibrahim to sacrifice his son. For many Nigeriens this year, affording that sacrifice may prove difficult.

Motorcycles, a common mode of transport in the region and essential for livestock trade, were recently banned due to security concerns. Authorities say they are frequently used by extremist groups operating across the Sahel.

Security in Niger has sharply deteriorated since a military coup ousted President Mohamed


On Wednesday, trader Zimbeye Sekaraou stood beside his flock at a busy market in Niamey, the capital. The sheep he brought came from Dioundiou, a town in the Dosso Region near the borders with Nigeria and Benin — an area increasingly plagued by violence and restrictions.

"The situation there is really very worrying at the moment," said Sekaraou. "There are

50,000 tonnes of wood in Niamey alone, about 25,000 trees contributing to deforestation, air pollution, and desertification.

The campaign includes social media outreach, street caravans, and a photo contest, with influencers and local artists joining the cause.

## Kenyans plant their age in trees to combat deforestation

**K**enya is battling to survive bio-diversity loss and climate change, and nowhere is this more obvious than here in Kitui County.

The riverbed is completely dry and Peter Kakai and his friend are digging deep, with no sign of water yet.

Kenya, like other countries in the East African region, is suffering from drought with three years of low, or no rainfall in some areas.

Local, Peter Kakai remembers that when he was young his local river was teeming with life and it flowed throughout the year.

In fact, he recalls that then the river flooded, denying his family access to the neighbouring villages.

Now, it's very different, the river that fed them and provided water has dried.

According to Kakai, he wakes up early each day to keep digging a well.

It's deep and the walls are at risk of collapsing.

Kakai blames deforestation, the

challenges.

Addressing the mourners, the organisation's James Ngumbau explains how each person can contribute a legacy by planting a tree for every birthday since their birth.

"She has rested at 103 years of age. That's why I have come today so that we can plant trees for her, and I will bring more seedlings towards the onset of the rainy season so that we can always celebrate her through tree planting. Next year as you celebrate her anniversary, you can plant another 103 trees in her memory, the following year 103, and that's how you will be remembering her," he tells the mourners.

Kenya's tree planting programme was prompted by the United Nations COP27 climate conference in Egypt in November 2022.

Countries agreed to financially assist vulnerable countries like Kenya, for loss and damage caused by the worst impacts of climate change.

This included a pledge to reverse forest loss by 2030, with the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Service (IPBES) warning that over 1 million animal and plant species now

With support from Save the Children, teens and young adults are spreading awareness both online and door-to-door. They are promoting mineral and organic charcoal as eco-friendly alternatives and encouraging citizens to plant a tree for every sheep sacrificed.

"Eco Eid" aims to show that tradition and environmental protection can go hand-in-hand, empowering youth to lead change in their communities.

In 2024, the initiative reached 3,700 people and distributed 1,000 tree seedlings.

Niger is one of the countries most affected by climate change, losing over 100,000 hectares of arable land annually.

Agriculture supports 80% of the population.

"Long time ago, this river used to flow throughout the year until sometimes it was uncrossable. But when people started uncontrolled deforestation, the river dried up and now we are digging 7 to 8 feet and beyond to get water. Now it looks like we have to replant our old trees like the indigenous trees so that we can see if we get water and sufficient rainfall as before," he says.

Now a government nationwide campaign is underway to plant 15 billion trees in Kenya by 2030. It's a mammoth task and everyone is being asked to take part.

At this funeral for Monica Malonza, her family is commemorating her death by planting a tree for each of the 103 years she lived.

The Plant Your Age Initiative is being led by the Green Africa Foundation which says it's already planted millions of trees.

The Foundation is a non-government organisation created in 2000 with the aim of creating community solutions to the continent's environmental

relentless use of trees for human use.

"Malonza's family is keen to take part in efforts to reverse environmental damage.

Her son Mwanzia Malonza is now 70 and intends to plant as many trees on his own behalf.

He says: I want to thank the Plant Your Age champion for coming and educating us about our environment here in Kenya. Now because I am also elderly, I will start planting 70 trees which represent my 70 years of age."

It's hoped the trees planted today will have a beneficial impact on the environment for younger generations like 10-year-old Victoria Kilonzo, the great-great-grandchild of Monica Malonza.

Now she has a message for her generation.

She says: "We should look after our environment. We should save some water for the trees, we should not cut down trees and if you cut down a tree you should replant another tree to replace that tree which you have cut down."

This tree nursery is supported by Climate Resilient Agribusiness for Tomorrow CRAFT, which says it aims to invest in climate smart agricultural solutions.

## We welcome intervention in the rubber sector

The Government of Liberia has taken a noticeable step to regulate prices in the rubber sector in the country effective this June, thanks to intervention by President Joseph Boakai.

This paper gathered that President Boakai has constituted the Liberia National Rubber Pricing Committee headed by the Ministry of Agriculture to ensure fair pricing in the rubber sector.

We think this is an applaudable action because rubber farmers across the country have complained of bad pricing for too long that has cheated them of the actual benefit of their labor.

For too long farmers in the country have been subjected to being price takers, which put them in a very disadvantageous position at the hands of Firestone Plantations in Harbel, Margibi County and the Liberia Agriculture Company in Grand Bassa County, respectively, the major firms here.

These two foreign companies have always offered low prices, leaving farmers, who are restricted to sell only at home, with no choice despite advocating to be allowed to sell to buyers of their choice outside the country.

Because of persistent low prices, local farmers across the country have never benefited from their crops despite toiling in their rain and the sun, day and night in cultivating their farms.

It is our hope that this time around, the latest intervention by the government thru the President will bring long desired relief to rubber farmers in the country.

According to a resolution from the meeting, the Government of Liberia's decision was triggered by numerous complaints from rubber farmers in the country about unfair pricing in the rubber sector. The latest move comes after a series of meetings among members of the Liberia National Rubber Pricing Committee during which a scenario for determining a fair monthly price of rubber was unanimously agreed upon, from several scenarios presented by a technical sub-committee.

The Ministry of Agriculture is quoted as saying "The committee has resolved that the monthly price of rubber will be derived from an average of the daily prices of one ton of rubber for the preceding month posted on the Singapore Commodity Exchange, applying a 58 percent dry rubber content to get the actual, from which the production cost is deducted, and the resultant amount be used to calculate 10 percent profit margin for the processor."

We hope this will become sincerely turning point for our local farmers in getting worth for their production.

## The Trump Doctrine

NEW YORK – US President Donald Trump's second administration is barely four months old, but already there are signs of an emerging foreign policy doctrine. And like so much else about his presidency, it represents a striking departure from the past.

Doctrines play an important role in American foreign policy. With the Monroe Doctrine, announced in 1823, the United States asserted that it would be the preeminent power in the Western Hemisphere and would prevent other countries from establishing competitive strategic positions in the region. At the outset of the Cold War, the Truman Doctrine pledged US support to countries fighting Communism and Soviet-backed subversion.

More recently, the Carter Doctrine signaled that the US would not stand by if an outside force sought to gain control of the oil-rich Persian Gulf region. The Reagan Doctrine promised assistance to anti-Communist, anti-Soviet forces and countries. George W. Bush's Freedom Doctrine, among other things, made clear that neither terrorists nor those who harbored them would be safe from attack.

What these and other doctrines have in common is that they signal to multiple audiences critical US interests and what the US is prepared to do to advance them. Doctrines are intended to reassure friends and allies, deter actual or would-be enemies, galvanize the bureaucracy tasked with national security matters, and educate the public.

Although no Trump Doctrine has been explicitly put forward, one has begun to emerge all the same. You could call it the "look the other way" doctrine, the "see no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil" doctrine, or the "none of our business" doctrine.

Whatever the label, the doctrine signals that the US will no longer try to influence or react to how countries conduct themselves within their borders. The administration has refrained from criticizing Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan for arresting his principal political opponent, Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for repeated attempts to weaken the country's judiciary, or Hungary's long-serving prime minister, Viktor Orban, who has steadily undermined democratic institutions there.

While Trump has disparaged the foreign policy of Russian President Vladimir Putin and the economic policy of Chinese President Xi Jinping, he has not made an issue of either leader's repression of his own people. The Trump administration has also cut back or dismantled many of the instruments, including Voice of America, the Agency for International Development, and the National Endowment for Democracy, long used to promote civil society and democratic movements around the world.

The closest there was to a public *articulation* of the new doctrine came in Saudi Arabia on May 13. Trump spoke with admiration of what he described as that country's great transformation, adding it "has not come from Western interventionists ... giving you lectures on how to live and how to govern your own affairs ... In recent years, far too many American presidents have been afflicted with the notion that it's our job to

look into the souls of foreign leaders and use US policy to dispense justice for their sins." Trump's actions, above all his pursuit of business deals with authoritarian governments in the Gulf and far beyond, underscore these words' import. Unlike Reagan, Carter, Bush, Barack Obama, and Joe Biden, Trump has made it clear that the US has no interest in advocating for human rights and democracy, speaking out against authoritarian abuses, and pressing for the release of political dissidents. To be sure, the look-the-other-way doctrine avoids the sort of overreach that characterized Bush's presidency, when zeal for spreading democracy led to the costly, ill-advised invasion of Iraq. It also makes it easier for the US to work constructively with governments carrying out policies at home that would normally pose an obstacle to commercial ties or cooperation on critical bilateral, regional, or global issues.

But the downsides of the new approach offset these considerations. The Trump Doctrine increases the odds that governments so inclined will double down on domestic repression and efforts to subvert democracy – a form of government often associated not just with greater personal freedom but also with free markets supported by the rule of law and less aggressive foreign policy. Promoting democracy thus benefits US investors and limits the risk that America becomes mired in costly or prolonged foreign conflicts.

The Trump Doctrine also distances the US from many of its traditional friends and allies, most of which, not coincidentally, happen to be democracies. Such estrangement works against American influence.

That said, the ability of the US to conduct a foreign policy that supports freedom abroad depends in no small part on its willingness to practice what it preaches. No country can talk the talk without walking the walk, and the Trump administration's violation of many of the norms and practices that sustain democracy would undermine its ability to advocate for it elsewhere, were it so inclined. No doctrine is entirely consistent – during the Cold War, the US often supported anti-Communists who were anything but democrats – and Trump's doctrine is no exception. There is a self-serving, rightist bias. His administration has been critical of European governments and has made clear its preference for far-right forces, including the nationalist Karol Nawrocki, who won Poland's presidency. Despite reducing America's foreign entanglements, Trump has also waged a campaign against Greenland and Canada.

But these are exceptions. The thrust of the Trump Doctrine – not to allow anti-democratic behavior to get in the way of doing business – is clear.

For a long time, the US sought to change the world, annoying some and inspiring others. Those days are gone, in some ways for better, but mostly for worse. The US has changed. It is coming to resemble many of the countries and governments it once criticized. It is as tragic as it is ironic.



S'exprimant à la suite de l'élection du Libéria à un siège non permanent pour la période 2026-2027, le président Boakai a salué cette victoire diplomatique comme une reconnaissance de la résilience du peuple libérien et un hommage au parcours du pays vers la paix, la stabilité et la coopération internationale.

« Aujourd'hui, nous nous tenons à l'aube d'un nouveau chapitre de l'histoire de notre nation. L'élection du Libéria au Conseil de sécurité des Nations Unies, pour la période 2026-2027, honore notre engagement envers la paix et la solidarité mondiale. Ce succès va à la fois à l'ensemble national : il incarne la persévérance du continent africain et rend hommage aux générations de Libériens attachés à la liberté, à l'autodétermination et à la coopération mondiale », a déclaré le chef de l'État.

Avec un total de 181 voix en sa

faveur, bien au-delà du seuil requis des deux tiers (129 voix), le Libéria a été élu le mardi 3 juin pour siéger au sein de l'un des organes les plus influents de l'ONU. # Editorial

## La doctrine Trump

**N**EW YORK – En à peine quatre mois de deuxième administration du président américain Donald Trump, les premiers signes d'une doctrine en matière de politique étrangère apparaissent d'ores et déjà. Comme bien d'autres aspects de la présidence Trump 2.0, cette doctrine marque une rupture majeure par rapport au passé.

Les doctrines jouent un rôle de premier plan dans la politique étrangère américaine. À travers la doctrine Monroe formulée en 1823, les États-Unis ont affirmé qu'ils s'imposeraient comme la puissance prééminente sur le continent américain, et qu'ils empêcheraient tout autre pays d'établir des positions stratégiques concurrentes dans la région. De même, au début de la guerre froide, la doctrine Truman a promis un soutien des États-Unis à tous les pays qui lutteraient contre le communisme et la stratégie de subversion soviétique.

Plus récemment, la doctrine Carter a énoncé que les États-Unis ne resteraient pas spectateurs si une force extérieure cherchait à prendre le contrôle de la région du golfe Persique, riche en pétrole. La doctrine Reagan a promis assistance aux mouvements et pays opposés au communisme. Celle de George W. Bush, axée sur la liberté, a notamment adressé le message selon lequel ni les terroristes, ni ceux qui les protégeraient ne seraient à l'abri d'une intervention armée.

Point comme entre ces doctrines, elles font toutes savoir à différents destinataires quels sont les intérêts fondamentaux des États-Unis, et ce que le pays est prêt à faire pour les promouvoir. Les doctrines visent à rassurer amis et alliés, à dissuader ennemis réels ou potentiels, à galvaniser les agences en charge des questions de sécurité nationale, ainsi qu'à informer les citoyens. Non formulée explicitement par Trump, une nouvelle doctrine américaine émerge pourtant actuellement, que l'on pourrait qualifier de doctrine des « yeux fermés », du « rien vu, rien entendu », ou du « cela ne nous regarde pas ».

Quelle qu'en soit l'appellation, cette doctrine semble énoncer que les États-Unis ne chercheront plus à influencer ni à réagir à la manière dont les autres pays se comporteront à l'intérieur de leurs propres frontières. C'est ainsi que l'administration américaine s'est abstenu de condamner l'arrestation arbitraire d'un opposant politique de premier plan par le président turc Recep Tayyip Erdogan, les manœuvres répétées du Premier ministre israélien Benjamin Netanyahu pour affaiblir le pouvoir judiciaire dans son pays, ou encore la manière dont le Premier ministre hongrois de longue date, Viktor Orbán, ne cesse de malmener les institutions démocratiques en Hongrie.

De même, Trump dénonce certes la politique étrangère du président russe Vladimir Poutine, ainsi que la politique économique du dirigeant chinois Xi Jinping, mais ne s'indigne en aucun cas de la répression que mènent l'un et l'autre contre leur propre population. L'administration Trump a par ailleurs décidé d'affaiblir voire de démanteler bon nombre des instruments – Voice of America, Agence des États-Unis pour le développement international, ou encore Dotation nationale pour la démocratie – employés depuis longtemps pour promouvoir la société civile et les mouvements démocratiques à travers le monde.

Ce qui se rapproche le plus d'une *formulation* publique de cette nouvelle doctrine a eu lieu en Arabie saoudite, le 13 mai dernier. Trump a en effet exprimé son admiration pour ce qu'il décrit comme une formidable transformation du Royaume, ajoutant que cette évolution n'était pas le fruit des efforts « d'interventionnistes occidentaux [...] qui vous donnent des leçons sur la manière de vivre et de gouverner vos propres affaires [...] Ces dernières années, trop de présidents américains ont considéré à tort qu'il était de notre devoir de sonder les âmes des dirigeants étrangers, et d'user de la politique américaine pour absoudre ou non leurs péchés ».

Les agissements de Trump, notamment sa recherche d'accords commerciaux avec plusieurs gouvernements autoritaires du Golfe et d'ailleurs, soulignent le poids de cette déclaration. À la différence de Reagan, de Carter, de Bush, de Barack Obama et de Joe Biden, Trump adresse ici clairement le message selon lequel les États-Unis n'ont plus l'intention de défendre les droits de l'homme et la démocratie, de condamner les méfaits de dirigeants étrangers autoritaires, ni de faire pression pour la libération d'opposants politiques.

Cette doctrine du « rien vu, rien entendu » évite certes aux États-Unis une dérive caractéristique de la présidence Bush, durant laquelle le zèle dans la propagation de la démocratie avait conduit à une invasion irréfléchie et coûteuse de l'Irak. Elle facilite par ailleurs pour les États-Unis un travail constructif auprès de gouvernements appliquant chez eux des politiques qui, en temps normal, constituaient un obstacle aux relations commerciales ou à la coopération sur des questions bilatérales, régionales ou mondiales essentielles.

Ce sont néanmoins les retombées négatives de cette approche qui l'emportent. La doctrine Trump accroît la probabilité que les gouvernements engagés sur cette voie redoublent d'efforts de répression intérieure et de subversion de la démocratie – régime politique caractérisé par davantage de liberté pour les individus, mais également par des marchés libres, soutenus par l'Etat de droit, et par une politique étrangère généralement moins agressive. La promotion de la démocratie est par conséquent bénéfique pour les investisseurs américains, et limite le risque que l'Amérique s'enlise à l'étranger dans des conflits coûteux ou prolongés.

d'implication de personnalités influentes, notamment le représentant du comté de Montserrado, Dixon Seboe, accusé d'avoir financé les présumés auteurs de l'attaque. De son côté, l'ancien président de la Chambre des représentants, Fonati Koffa, avait interrompu un voyage médical à l'étranger après avoir été désigné comme « personne d'intérêt » dans le cadre de l'enquête.

La coopération avec les experts américains, aujourd'hui repartis, traduisait initialement une volonté affichée des autorités libériennes de garantir une investigation rigoureuse et transparente, visant à faire toute la lumière sur les responsabilités.

Le 25 février 2025, le tribunal de première instance de Monrovia a jugé qu'il existait des preuves suffisantes pour traduire en justice les accusés Thomas Etheridge et Eric Sasay. Le magistrat titulaire L. Ben Barco a estimé que le parquet avait établi un cas prima facie, obligeant les deux hommes à répondre aux accusations

devant la Cour criminelle A du premier circuit judiciaire, au Temple de la Justice.

Les deux prévenus sont accusés d'avoir conspiré pour incendier le Capitole, causant des dommages estimés à plus de 8 millions de dollars américains. Des témoignages les désignent comme ayant acheté de l'essence pour provoquer l'incendie, perturbant les séances parlementaires. Ils sont également inculpés pour avoir agressé un agent de police durant l'attaque, le laissant inconscient, et pour s'être emparés de son arme de service.

Le magistrat Barco a souligné que les preuves matérielles collectées sur les lieux du crime, ainsi que les données extraites d'appareils électroniques associés aux accusés, appuient solidement la thèse de l'accusation. Il a précisé que ces éléments ont valeur de faits tant qu'ils ne sont pas efficacement réfutés.

Suite à cette décision, le tribunal a ordonné le transfert des dossiers et des accusés à la Cour criminelle A pour la suite de la procédure.

Il est impératif que l'approche à venir rompe avec les pratiques antérieures », a écrit Dunbar.

La construction du pont intervient quelques jours après que le ministère des Mines a suspendu les opérations de Huiran Mining, à la suite d'allégations de mines illégales, violations environnementales et non-respect des accords précédents. Une enquête complète a été lancée, portant sur les normes environnementales, les conditions de travail et les engagements communautaires.

Bien que les activités minières restent à l'arrêt, le ministère a autorisé la poursuite du chantier du pont, considéré comme un élément clé des obligations sociales de la société.

Les autorités ont promis un processus d'évaluation transparent et inclusif, sans pour autant fixer de date pour une reprise des opérations. Malgré l'accueil favorable réservé à l'initiative, plusieurs habitants adoptent une attitude prudente, évoquant des années de promesses non tenues et de mauvaise gestion communautaire.

« La population a trop longtemps fait preuve de patience », a déclaré un résident de Jackson Village. « Nous voulons des emplois, des routes, de l'eau potable — mais avant tout, nous exigeons de la reddition de comptes.

Ce pont est un bon début, mais il doit s'inscrire dans une action continue. » Marquée par cinq années de retards et d'opacité, la relation entre les communautés locales et la société minière reste fragile. Pour restaurer pleinement la confiance, Huiran Mining devra démontrer un engagement réel, durable et transparent.

Les citoyens appellent le député J. Marvin Cole à maintenir la pression afin de garantir que les projets de développement dépassent le cadre symbolique, et qu'ils répondent concrètement aux besoins des populations.

## Le maire de Monrovia sollicite des partenaires pour transformer les déchets en électricité

**F**ace à l'accumulation croissante des déchets dans la capitale libérienne, le maire de la ville de Monrovia, John Charuk S. Siafa, a lancé un appel à l'aide, tant au niveau national qu'international, afin de renforcer le système de gestion des déchets et d'explorer des solutions innovantes, notamment leur transformation en électricité.

Lors d'une conférence de presse tenue ce mardi, le maire Siafa a souligné l'urgence d'investir dans des solutions durables de gestion des déchets. Il a notamment plaidé en faveur de l'implication des entreprises communautaires (CBEs) et des petites et moyennes entreprises (PME) dans le recyclage et la valorisation énergétique des déchets.

« Nous recherchons activement des partenaires pour investir dans ce secteur afin que les déchets puissent être utilisés pour produire de l'électricité ou être recyclés », a déclaré le maire.

La Municipalité de Monrovia a récemment publié des appels à projets dans la presse locale, invitant les entreprises intéressées à soumettre des propositions pour des projets liés à la gestion des déchets. Plusieurs dossiers ont déjà été reçus et sont actuellement en cours d'évaluation.

« Nous procérons à l'examen des propositions pour identifier les candidats les plus aptes. Les résultats seront bientôt annoncés », a-t-il



indiqué.

Malgré ces avancées, le maire a réaffirmé que la MCC continue de rechercher activement de nouveaux investisseurs capables de soutenir des solutions de long terme et de transformer véritablement les déchets en ressource.

« Quelles que soient les mesures prises, les Libériens engagés dans la gestion des déchets — notamment les CBES et les PME — seront au premier plan. Nous espérons qu'ils prendront une part active dans cette initiative », a-t-il ajouté.

Il a également révélé qu'une entreprise libérienne figure parmi les finalistes du processus de présélection, une nouvelle qui suscite beaucoup d'espoir quant à la mise en œuvre de solutions locales et durables à la crise des déchets.

« Nous savons que cela prendra du temps, mais nous croyons fermement que nous y parviendrons », a affirmé le maire.

Sur le plan national, M. Siafa a annoncé que la Monrovia City Corporation a prévu une enveloppe d'un million de dollars dans son budget — en collaboration avec le gouvernement — pour financer des opérations de nettoyage urbain. Ce budget vise à décentraliser la collecte des déchets à travers Monrovia et ses environs.


« Nous avons déjà engagé des discussions avec le ministère des Finances. Pour la première fois, nous avons élaboré une stratégie qui permettra d'utiliser ce budget pour acquérir des équipements destinés aux administrateurs des districts et des communes, afin qu'ils collaborent directement avec la MCC », a-t-il précisé.

La MCC prévoit également de recruter des résidents locaux pour mener ces opérations. Ces travailleurs utiliseront des tricycles déjà distribués par la mairie pour collecter les déchets dans leurs communautés respectives, tandis que les camions les transporteront vers le site principal de décharge.

« Dès que les fonds seront débloqués, nous pourrons offrir un soutien encore plus conséquent », a-t-il assuré.

Le maire a par ailleurs évoqué l'introduction prochaine d'un service de collecte des déchets porte-à-porte, dont la mise en œuvre dépendra du soutien des investisseurs.

Enfin, la MCC multiplie les démarches auprès de partenaires bilatéraux. Selon M. Siafa, des pays comme la Chine ont déjà promis de faire don d'équipements — notamment des camions de pompiers, des bourses d'études et d'autres matériels — dont l'arrivée est prévue dans un avenir proche.



He emphasized that fiscal decentralization enhances citizen trust and compliance in tax systems when communities can witness the direct benefits of their contributions.

"When citizens see infrastructure and services delivered as a result of their tax payments, it builds confidence in governance and motivates continued compliance," Boykai said.

Also present at the workshop was McNeil Mani Wilson, Program Coordinator and Manager at the Governance Commission, who joined other facilitators in guiding participants through the framework of the Revenue Sharing Act and the future role of county-level treasuries.

**A**rcelorMittal Liberia has commissioned the country's first-ever world-class iron ore concentrator plant, marking a major milestone in the company's Phase II expansion and a transformative step for Liberia's mining sector.

The inauguration ceremony took place on Thursday, June 5, 2025, in Tokadeh, Nimba County. It was graced by President Joseph Nyumah Boakai, who called on all Liberians, especially those in concession areas, to embrace the investment and its long-term benefits for the nation.

"This event is a joyous occasion. It demonstrates confidence in Liberia's potential and future," President Boakai said, expressing gratitude to ArcelorMittal and the local communities that have supported the project.

He stressed the importance of stability and urged all parties to uphold the agreements that ensure the project's gains directly benefit the Liberian people.

The ceremony featured a ribbon-cutting by President Boakai, followed by a demonstrative test of the new concentrator. The event drew a broad audience, including government officials, members of the diplomatic corps, local leaders, and ArcelorMittal staff.

ArcelorMittal's Executive Chairman,
